

The Moriyama "house" is in fact a cluster of ten white boxes. Nishizawa wanted to keep the big 290 square metre site in harmony with the scale of the buildings surrounding it, so instead of making one big building he made ten small ones.

"One of our constant big concerns is how to create a relation between the inside and outside, this is very important for us to think about."

Ryue Nishizawa has completed a house in the suburbs of Tokyo where every room of the house is a seperate building.

the boxes form a little community unto themselves. The spaces between the boxes and the street edge take on a public/private role as community gardens, places of interaction.

The house became like a microcosm of a city; complete with towers, streets and parks.

The social contact, and mutual support that occur in a collective environment enhances security and quality of life. A village-like structure can develop.

Nevertheless, perhaps especially in a collective, the need for individual retreat and personal freedom must be catered for. For this reason the division between the individual dwellings is clearly marked. The units adjoin each other like row houses. Each has a private terrace or small garden. These are orientated towards the communal court and play areas.

The communal dining and living spaces, with their own roof terrace, are situated at the highest point. All the individual units have main kitchen or living spaces orientated towards the court.
